		A Brisbane medical school is given an exemption under the <i>Classification of Computer Games and Images Act 1995</i> , section 59, to allow the medical school to possess computer images of tortured children, and to distribute the images to its medical students. The exemption is subject to a condition that the medical students are not allowed to distribute the images to anyone, including to themselves at another computer. Amy, a medical student, sends a copy of the images to her home computer and also to her brother Bob's computer.
