- (2) For a nomination under subsection (1) to be effective, the 26 nomination must be accompanied by a declaration signed by 27 the nominee stating that the nominee will not disclose, for 28 public dissemination, any classified patient information 29 relating to the classified patient disclosed to the nominee 30 under this part.
- (3) A nomination under this section supersedes any other 32 nomination made by the relevant person under this section or 33 section 318C(4).
