FISHERIES REGULATION 1995

[reprinted as in force on 24 March 1995]

PART 1—PRELIMINARY

Short title

1. This regulation may be cited as the *Fisheries Regulation 1995*.

Definitions

- **2.** In this regulation—
- "assistant fisher" means a person who holds an assistant fisher licence.
- "buyer" means a person who holds a buyer licence.
- "commercial fisher" means a person who holds a commercial fisher licence.
- **"community fisher"** means a person who is a member of a community for which a person holds a community fisher licence.
- "fisher" means a person who holds a fisher licence.
- **"hull unit"**, for a boat, means a hull unit worked out under the Authority's document entitled 'Guidelines for Queensland East Coast Otter Trawl Vessels'. ¹
- "processor" means a person who holds a processor licence.

⁽a) the Authority's office at 157 Ann Street, Brisbane 4000; or

⁽b) an office of the Department's Queensland Boating and Fisheries Patrol.

PART 2—AUTHORITIES

Division 1—Licences

Licences chief executive may issue

- **3.(1)** The chief executive may issue the following types of licences—
 - aquaculture licences
 - aquaculture boat licences
 - coral limestone licences.
- (2) The chief executive may issue—
 - (a) an aquaculture licence—
 - (i) for oystering; or
 - (ii) to occupy an oyster ground as an oyster bank; and
 - (b) an aquaculture boat licence for use of a boat for pearling or oystering.
- (3) The chief executive may issue a coral limestone licence as an exclusive coral limestone licence.

Licences Authority may issue

- **4.(1)** The Authority may issue the following types of licences—
 - boat licences
 - buyer licences
 - coral, shell grit or star sand licences
 - fisher licences
 - pearl dealer licences
 - processor licences.
- (2) The Authority may issue each of the following licences in the categories stated for the licence—

- (a) boat licences—carrier, community, coral, pearling, primary, shell grit, star sand or tender boat licence;
- (b) buyer licences—Class A, B, C or D buyer licence;
- (c) fisher licences—commercial, assistant or community fisher licence;
- (d) processor licences—Class A or B processor licence.
- (3) The Authority may issue a coral, shell grit or star sand licence as an exclusive coral, shell grit or star sand licence.

What licences must state

- **5.** The fisheries agency must state in—
 - (a) an aquaculture, coral, coral limestone, shell grit or star sand licence—the area covered by the licence; and
 - (b) a processor licence—the place covered by the licence.

Division 2—Permits

Permits chief executive may issue

- **6.(1)** The chief executive may issue the following types of permits—
 - aquaculture permits
 - fisheries resources permits
 - fish way permits
 - marine plant permits.
- (2) However, the chief executive may only issue the following permits for a purpose stated for the permit—
 - (a) aquaculture permit—
 - cultivating fish (other than oysters) for human consumption
 - cultivating pearl oysters
 - keeping fish for stocking other waters

- putting oysters in Queensland waters
- using boats, aquaculture furniture and fishing apparatus for aquaculture purposes;
- (b) fisheries resources permit—
 - performing works or a related activity in a declared fish habitat area
 - removing fisheries resources from waters for restocking other waters
 - research about stated fisheries resources, fishing apparatus or boats:
- (c) marine plant permit—
 - displaying marine plants
 - burning, cutting, destroying, lopping or removing marine plants.

Permits Authority may issue

- **7.(1)** The Authority may issue general fisheries permits.
- (2) The Authority may issue a general fisheries permit for any of the following purposes—
 - assessing the commercial viability of a fishing activity, apparatus, boat or activity
 - buying, taking, possessing or selling regulated fish
 - collecting broodstock for aquaculture activities
 - conducting exploratory fishing
 - conducting research about fish, fishing apparatus or boats
 - developing fishing activities for a particular species of fish
 - developing fishing apparatus or boats
 - displaying fish
 - releasing fish into the wild
 - taking a particular species of fish for predator control and selling

the fish

- taking fish for restocking other places
- taking, possessing or selling non-indigenous or noxious fish
- using fishing apparatus for shark management purposes
- taking a particular species of fish or worms for bait
- taking, possessing or selling a particular species of fish.

Division 3—Other authorities

Other authorities the Authority may issue

- **8.**(1) The Authority may issue registration authorities.
- (2) The Authority may issue the authority for a boat, place or vehicle.

What authorities must state

9. A registration authority must state the particulars necessary to identify the boat, place or vehicle registered and the activity covered by the authority.

Examples—

- 1. A place may be registered as a place where fish may be inspected or processed.
- 2. A boat or vehicle may be registered as a boat or vehicle in which fish may be carried.

Division 4—Transfer

Authorities that are not transferable

- **10.** Each of the following authorities is not transferable—
 - an aquaculture boat licence for use of a boat for pearling
 - an aquaculture licence for oystering
 - a community boat licence
 - a pearl dealer licence

- a coral, shell grit or star sand boat licence
- a fisher licence
- a pearling boat licence
- a processor licence for processing fish other than for human consumption.

PART 3—FISHERIES OFFENCES

Division 1—Acts that may be done only by authority holders

Use of boat

- **11.(1)** This section does not apply to a boat used for taking coral, coral limestone, shell grit or star sand.
- (2) A person may use, be in control of, or allow the use of, a boat (other than a pearling boat) to take fish for trade or commerce only if—
 - (a) a boat licence is in force for the boat; or
 - (b) a general fisheries permit allows the boat's use for taking fish for trade or commerce.
- (3) A person may use, be in control of, or allow the use of, a pearling boat only if—
 - (a) the person is a commercial pearl fisher or holds a pearling boat licence for the boat; or
 - (b) a pearling boat licence is in force for the boat.

Who may be on a boat

- **12.(1)** The owner of a boat, or a person in control of the boat, may allow another person to be on board it while it is used to take fish for trade or commerce only if—
 - (a) the other person is a commercial, assistant or community fisher;

or

- (b) the boat is being used under an authority other than a licence.
- (2) However, subsection (1)(a) does not apply to the spouse, de facto spouse or a child of the boat's owner or of a commercial or community fisher if the spouse, de facto spouse or child does not help take fish.

Taking fish

- **13.(1)** This section does not apply to the taking of coral, coral limestone, green snails, pearls, pearl oysters, pearl shells, shell grit, star sand or trochus.
 - (2) A person may take fish for trade or commerce only if—
 - (a) the person is—
 - (i) a commercial or community fisher; or
 - (ii) an assistant fisher who takes fish in the company of and under the direction of a commercial or community fisher; or
 - (b) the person takes fish under an authority (other than a licence) allowing the person to take fish for trade or commerce.

Processing fish

- **14.(1)** A person may, for trade or commerce, process fish, or use a place for fish processing, only if the person is a processor or holds a permit allowing the processing or use.
 - (2) However, subsection (1) does not apply—
 - (a) to a person who processes fish for immediate human consumption; or
 - (b) for fish lawfully taken by a commercial or community fisher, or a holder of a primary or tender boat licence—to freezing, refrigerating, cleaning, filleting, sorting, salting or cooking fish; or
 - (c) for a buyer or fish retailer—to refrigerating, thawing or sorting fish.

Selling fish

- 15.(1) This section does not apply to—
 - (a) the sale of coral, coral limestone, green snails, pearls, pearl oysters, pearl shells, shell grit, star sand or trochus; or
 - (b) the wholesale sale of fish to a person engaged in the retail sale of fish.
- (2) A person may sell fish lawfully taken by the person only if the person—
 - (a) is a commercial or community fisher; or
 - (b) holds a primary or tender boat licence; or
 - (c) holds an authority allowing the sale of fish.

Buying fish

- **16.(1)** This section does not apply to a person who lawfully buys fish for resale by retail.
- (2) A person may buy fish for trade or commerce, or act as an agent of a person who buys fish for trade or commerce, only if the person holds a buyer licence or another authority allowing the person to buy fish.

Aquaculture

17. A person may engage in aquaculture only if the person holds an aquaculture licence or permit and cultivates the fisheries resources stated in the licence or permit.

Coral, coral limestone, shell grit or star sand

- **18.(1)** A person may take coral, coral limestone, shell grit or star sand only if the person takes the coral, coral limestone, shell grit or star sand under an authority allowing it to be taken.
- (2) A person may take coral, coral limestone, shell grit or star sand from an area stated in an exclusive coral, coral limestone, shell grit or star sand licence, only if the person holds the licence.

(3) A person may use a boat for taking coral, coral limestone, shell grit or star sand only if the person uses the boat under an authority allowing its use for taking coral, coral limestone, shell grit or star sand.

Pearls, pearl oysters, pearl shells, trochus and green snails

- **19.(1)** A person may take pearls, pearl oysters, pearl shells, trochus or green snails only if the person is a commercial pearl fisher.
- (2) A person may assist in taking pearls, pearl oysters, pearl shells, trochus or green snails only if the person is a commercial pearl fisher or assistant pearl fisher.
- (3) A person may, in an area in Queensland waters, put pearl oysters, trochus or green snails taken from another area only under an authority allowing the person to put the pearl oysters, trochus or green snails in the area.

Division 2—Miscellaneous

Offence to contravene condition of an authority

20. An authority holder must not contravene a condition of the authority. Maximum penalty—100 penalty units.

Prohibited ways of taking fish

- **21.(1)** The following ways of taking fish are prohibited—
 - (a) jagging;
 - (b) using a spear or spear gun and underwater breathing apparatus (other than a snorkel).
- (2) However, subsection (1)(b) does not apply to a commercial, assistant or community fisher if the person's licence or permit allows the use of a spear or spear gun.
- (3) For fish in fresh water that is not privately owned, the following ways of taking fish are prohibited—

- (a) using a fishing line other than a fishing line with only 1 hook or a lure attached;
- (b) setting a fishing line as a cross-line;
- (c) setting more than 6 fishing lines.

Example of 'privately owned fresh water' in subsection (3)—

Water in a dam on privately owned land, if the dam is not built across a waterway.

(4) For fish in tidal water, taking fish by using a fishing line with more than 6 hooks attached is prohibited.

Noxious fisheries resources

- **22.** The following fisheries resources are noxious fisheries resources—
 - European carp (*Cyprinus carpio*)
 - piranha (all species of the genera *Pygocentrus*, *Pygopristis* and *Serrasalmus*)
 - tilapia (all species of the genus *Tilapia* and *Oreochromis*)
 - walking catfish (all species of the family Clariidae).

PART 4—MISCELLANEOUS

Regulated fish

- 23. The following fish are regulated fish—
 - (a) gastropod or bivalve mollusc (all species other than oysters (family Ostreidae));
 - (b) fish included in the Fishing Industry Organisation and Marketing

Regulation 1991, sections 372 and 383 and schedule 8.4

Declared fisheries resources

24. Regulated fish are fisheries resources to which section 154 of the Act⁵ applies.

Forfeiture offences

25. An offence mentioned in section 78 of the Act⁶ is an offence to which section 154 of the Act⁵ applies.

Threshold percentage

26. The threshold percentage for section 154 of the Act⁵ is 5%.

Service fee

- **27.(1)** The fee payable to the Authority for—
 - (a) entering particulars of a boat licence and boat for which the licence was issued pending construction or purchase of another boat is 1/2 the fee payable for renewing the licence; and
 - (b) changing an entry of particulars mentioned in paragraph (a) is—
 - (i) for a primary otter trawl boat—each hull unit—\$33.00; or
 - (ii) for a primary boat (other than an otter trawl boat)—\$233.00; or
 - (iii) for a tender boat (endorsed for a line fishery)—\$104.00; or

- (iv) for a tender boat (not endorsed)—\$73.00.
- (2) In subsection (1)—
- "fee payable for renewing the licence" means the total of the following fees—
 - (a) assessment fee;
 - (b) renewal fee;
 - (c) endorsement fee.

Other fees

- **28.(1)** The fees payable under the Act and this regulation are stated in the schedule.
 - (2) Unless otherwise stated in the schedule—
 - (a) the fee stated for an authority is for its issue; and
 - (b) the renewal fee for an authority (other than a permit) is the same as the fee stated for its issue; and
 - (c) a fee stated is not an assessment fee.⁷

Under section 60 of the Act (Notice of refusal of application for issue or renewal etc.) assessment fees are not refundable.
