# Water (Fee Unit Conversion) Amendment Regulation 2022

## **Human Rights Certificate**

#### Prepared in accordance with Part 3 of the Human Rights Act 2019

In accordance with section 41 of the *Human Rights Act 2019*, I, Glenn Butcher MP, Minister for Regional Development and Manufacturing and Minister for Water provide this human rights certificate with respect to the *Water (Fee Unit Conversion) Amendment Regulation 2022* made under the *Water Act 2000*.

In my opinion, the *Water (Fee Unit Conversion) Amendment Regulation 2022*, as tabled in the Legislative Assembly, is compatible with the human rights protected by the *Human Rights Act 2019*. I base my opinion on the reasons outlined in this statement.

### **Overview of the Subordinate Legislation**

The purpose of the *Water Regulation 2016* is to support the application of the provisions of the *Water Act 2000*. The amendments to the *Water Regulation 2016* are to:

- 1. convert regulatory fees and charges from fee dollars to fee units for fees associated with the allocation, supply or taking of water under the *Water Regulation 2016*, and payable to the chief executive of the Department of Regional Development, Manufacturing and Water (the Department); and
- 2. make minor and technical amendments to the *Water Regulation 2016* to remove redundant requirements about water management areas and the application of relevant fees and charges.

The fee unit value is specified in the *Acts Interpretation (Fee Unit) Regulation 2022* and will adjust fees and charges levied accordingly from 1 July 2022.

The minor amendments and corrections will achieve consistency and currency of the department legislation in line with government objectives

### **Human Rights Issues**

There are no Human Rights issues relevant to the Water (Fee Unit Conversion) Amendment Regulation 2022.

I consider that the *Water (Fee Unit Conversion) Amendment Regulation 2022* is compatible with the *Human Rights Act 2019* because it does not raise a human rights issue.
