Sugar Industry Regulation 2022

Human Rights Certificate

Prepared in accordance with Part 3 of the Human Rights Act 2019

In accordance with section 41 of the *Human Rights Act 2019*, I, Mark Furner MP, Minister for Agricultural Industry Development and Fisheries and Minister for Rural Communities, provide this human rights certificate with respect to the *Sugar Industry Regulation 2022* made under the *Sugar Industry Act 1999*.

In my opinion, the *Sugar Industry Regulation 2022*, as tabled in the Legislative Assembly, is compatible with the human rights protected by the *Human Rights Act 2019*. I base my opinion on the reasons outlined in this statement.

Overview of the Subordinate Legislation

The Sugar Industry Regulation 2022 (the Regulation) is made under the Sugar Industry Act 1999 (the Act).

The authorising laws for the Regulation are sections 237, and 257 of the Act.

The main objective of the Regulation is to remake the *Sugar Industry Regulation 2010* to continue to give effect to section 237 of the Act which provides that certain actions related to making or varying a collective contract between a group of growers and a mill owner who are within the same region are authorised for the *Competition and Consumer Act 2010* (*Commonwealth*), section 51(1)(b) or the *Competition Code*, section 51. It does this by:

a) defining Local Government Areas (regions for collective contracts); and,

b) updating the prescribed Local Government Areas in the Regulation to reflect current local government boundaries.

Human Rights Issues

Human rights relevant to the subordinate legislation (Part 2, Division 2 and 3 Human Rights Act 2019)

The human rights prescribed in sections 15 to 37 of the *Human Rights Act 2019* have been considered in regard to the *Sugar Industry Regulation 2022*. The Regulation is merely facilitatory in nature, serving only to remake the *Sugar Industry Regulation 2010* which expires under the provisions of the *Statutory Instruments Act 1992* and continues to prescribe regions relevant to section 237 of the Act.

The remaking of the *Sugar Industry Regulation* 2010 is considered to be consistent with human rights and, therefore, it has been determined that it does not raise any human rights issues.

Conclusion

I consider that the *Sugar Industry Regulation 2022* is compatible with the *Human Rights Act 2019* because it does not limit human rights.
